





Adult Classics for Teens











Little Women by Louisa May Alcott

Fahrenheit 451 by Ray Bradbury

A totalitarian regime has ordered all books to be destroyed, but one of the book burners suddenly realizes their merit in a chilling novel of a frightening near-future world.

Jane Eyre by Charlotte Bronte

Growing up in the home of a cruel aunt and a harsh charity school, Jane Eyre, an orphaned young woman, accepts employment as a governess at Thornfield Hall and soon finds herself in love with her employer, the enigmatic Rochester.

David Copperfield by Charles Dickens

Young David Copperfield endures hardships as a child laborer in this partly autobiographical classic reflecting social conditions in 19th century England.

The Three Musketeers by Alexandre Dumas

D'Artagnan, an impetuous young man determined to join the King's Musketeers, finds himself in an alliance with three of the group's finest swordsmen as they try to foil a plot by scheming Cardinal Richelieu and his agent, the wicked Lady de Winter.

The Great Gatsby by F. Scott Fitzgerald

This classic novel portrays the Jazz Age and all its decadence and excess as it follows the life of Jay Gatsby, a newly rich man obsessed with money, power and glamour.

Lord of the Flies by William Golding

A classic study of human nature which depicts the degeneration of a group of schoolboys marooned on a desert island.

Brave New World by Aldous Huxley

Huxley's terrifying prophetic novel describes the socialized horrors of a futuristic utopian society devoid of individual freedom.


Flowers for Algernon by Daniel Keyes

A Separate Peace by John Knowles

A conflict of loyalties at a New England boarding school between Gene and his fearless friend, Phineas, leads to tragedy.

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To Kill a Mockingbird by Harper Lee

The explosion of racial hate and violence in a small Alabama town is viewed by a young girl whose father defends a black man accused of rape.

1984: A Novel by George Orwell

Portrays a terrifying vision of life in the future when a totalitarian government watches over all citizens and directs all activities, becoming more powerful as time goes by.

The Catcher in the Rye by J. D. Salinger

In an effort to escape the hypocrisies of life at his boarding school, 16-year-old Holden Caulfield seeks refuge in New York City.

Frankenstein by Mary Wollstonecraft Shelley

The classic story of science and the search for the origins of life follows Dr. Frankenstein and the obsessive experiment that leads to the creation of a monstrous and deadly creature.

A Tree Grows in Brooklyn by Betty Smith

Young Francie Nolan, having inherited both her father's romantic and her mother's practical natures, struggles to survive and thrive growing up in the slums of Brooklyn in the early twentieth century.

Of Mice and Men by John Steinbeck

The tragic story of the friendship between two migrant workers, George and Lenny, and their dream of owning a farm.

Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde by Robert Louis Stevenson

A kindly scientist, Dr. Jekyll, attempts to explore the most loathsome forces of evil and the dark side of human nature behind the doors of his London laboratory.

The Hobbit, or, There and Back Again by J. R. R. Tolkien

Bilbo Baggins, a well-to-do hobbit, lives in the comforts of his hobbit-hole until the notorious wizard Gandalf and his group of dwarves choose him to take part in an adventure from which he may never return.

The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn by Mark Twain

A young boy living in mid-nineteenth century Missouri relates the many adventures that he and his friend Jim, an escaped slave, experience as they travel down the Mississippi River on a raft.

The War of the Worlds by H. G. Wells
