CHARLES DICKENS TRIVIA

Dickens' use of "Merry Christmas" throughout the book popularized the greeting which was not widely used used prior. Charles Dickens started writing A Christmas Carol in October 1843 and finished it six weeks later at the end of November so it could be published in time for Christmas. It hit the shops on December 17, 1843 and sold out the 6000 printed copies in three or four days. Two month after A Christmas Carol was published, Parley's Illuminated Library pirated it. It was called A Christmas Ghost Story and sold for a penny. Dickens sued and won the case. Parley's declared itself bankrupt, leaving Dickens to pay the court costs.

Dickens was the first famous writer to give public readings of his work. His first reading was of <u>A Christmas Carol</u> in 1853 in Birmingham, England. His last public reading was also of <u>A Christmas Carol</u> in 1870 when he retired from public performances due to health issues. Dickens visited American twice on his reading tours. In New York, during his second tour at Christmastime of 1867, people camped out in the snow to get a ticket. By the time of the performance, the line was a mile long. On the second tour, he earned the equivalent of \$1.4 million in today's money, which was far more that he was earning in royalties. It was said in the Chicago Tribune that surely Dickens would come to Chicago on that tour. It was thought that he would come not only to read, but to visit the grave of his brother, Augustus, who had lived in Chicago and had died the year before. But, Dickens never visited Chicago.

Tiny Tim was originally to be named Little Fred, possibly after one of Dickens's brothers, two of whom were named Frederick and Alfred. The name was changed just prior to going to print. A Christmas Carol was not the first Christmas ghost story written by Dickens. "The Story of the Goblins Who Stole a Sexton" was published in The Pickwick Papers in 1836-7. Many of the scenarios are carried over into A Christmas Carol. Novelist William Thackerey, not always an admirer of Dickens called the novella "a national benefit". Historian Thomas Carlyle went out and bought himself a turkey after reading A Christmas Carol.



Victorian Christmas Traditions

The Golden Nest – It is legend that good luck comes to the household that has a nest among the branches of the Christmas tree. Within the glittery nest are cradled the golden eggs of prosperity. May you be rich with health, happiness and friendship.

Cards – Christmas cards were first created and published in 19th century England. Long before that time, though, people sent Season's Greetings to loved ones. Louis Prang first published cards using the "new" chromolithography (color process).

Some of our favorite carols are so old that their origins are lost in history. Every country has its own special carols, but some – such as "Silent Night" – are universal.
