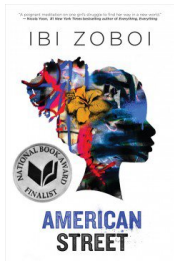


All We Have Left

by Amie Kaufman

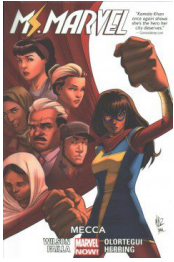

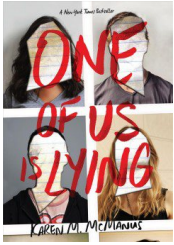

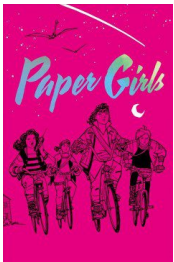
When those around Kamala are targeted by an enemy from her past, everything about her is called into question, and with no one to trust, Ms. Marvel finds help from an unexpected source.

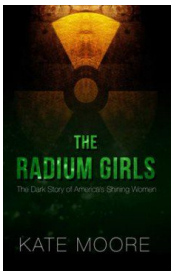

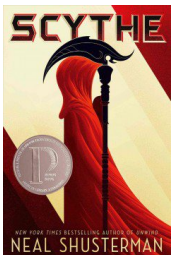

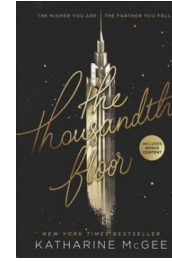

by Neal Shusterman

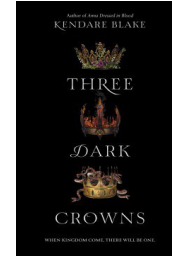

by Kendare Blake

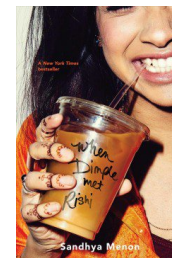

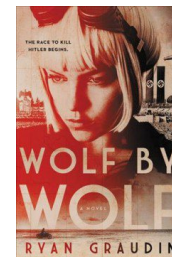
