


The wall by Eve Bunting


A boy and his father visit the Vietnam Veteran's Memorial in Washington, D.C., in a work about memory and loss.



10,000 days of thunder : a history of the Vietnam War by Philip Caputo


Provides young readers with an in-depth examination of the Vietnam War through a review of its significant events and battles as well as the social

unrest caused by it in the United States, with profiles of the major players of the period, including Ho Chi Minh and Richard Nixon.




Vietnam : A History of the War by Russell Freedman
