


The Lost Family by Jenna Blum

In 1965, an Auschwitz survivor is resigned to solitude until he meets and marries, but the horrors of his past soon overshadow him and his new family.




There There by Tommy Orange

A novel that grapples with the complex history and identity of Native Americans follows twelve characters.




Last Stories by William Trevor

A notable storyteller presents ten thought-provoking tales that illuminate the human condition.




The Female Persuasion by Meg Wolitzer

Collects short stories about love, death, and struggle, including one in which a brother and sister discuss their father's killing of another man.




The Sparsholt Affair by Alan Hollinghurst
