

Reyna Grande is an awardwinning novelist, and is famous for her memoir *The Distance Between Us*, which captures the heartbreak of the children who are left behind when their



parents cross the border. She has received an American Book Award, the El Premio Aztlán Literary Award, and the International Latino Book Award. In 2012, she was a finalist for the prestigious National Book Critics Circle Awards, and in 2015 she was honored with a Luis Leal Award for Distinction in Chicano/Latino

Literature. Her works have been published internationally in Norway, South Korea, and Mexico.



After attending Pasadena City College for two years, Reyna obtained a B.A. in creative writing and film & video from the University of California, Santa Cruz. She later received her M.F.A. in creative writing from Antioch University. Now, in addition to being a published author, she is also a soughtafter motivational speaker at high schools, colleges, and universities across the nation.


